The Ottawa Valley Pistol League

IN THE WINTER of 1960 the Ottawa Valley Pistol League (OVPL) was formally constituted. Five teams agreed to a series of home-at-home matches, with the host team supplying the refreshments. Those teams were: RCMP "A" Division; RCMP "HQ" Division; Arnprior; Smith Falls and the National Defence Headquarters Rifle Association. Four of the five founding members-Red Doolittle, Ed Wilson, Harold Nichol and Brian King—are still active in the league. Just proves that you do not have to be young and foolish to enjoy a night out at the shooting range. Sadly, the fifth founding member, Larry Gaines, died a few years ago.

In the beginning an NRA gallery course of both .22 and centrefire was shot. With the introduction of ISU standard pistol and centrefire, these courses were also adopted. Today some clubs choose to shoot ISU, while others mix ISU and NRA courses. This proves challenging and demands a degree of flexibility from the shooters.

Over the years other teams have joined in and, unfortunately, some have disappeared. For a couple of years the US Embassy fielded a joint team of army, navy, and air force personnel stationed in Ottawa (JANAF). In the late 1960s another club joined and has been a powerhouse ever since—the Civil Service Recreation Association Fun Club, usually called the RA. Neither of the RCMP teams are still active; their interest waned when the PPC became their forte. It is interesting to look back at those two teams: either could field a squad consisting of 10 master-class shooters on any given evening.

Although the OVPL has probably never had more than six teams at any time, it has been a breeding ground for Canada's national team. Names to conjure with include Jim Zavitz, Jim Thurlow, Bill Hare, Steve Kelly and, last but certainly not least, Olympic gold medalist Linda Thom.

The OVPL usually starts its season right after Christmas and continues until each team has played both host and visitor to all other teams. Home teams still provide the refreshments and Amprior has the reputation of being the place to go to eat. It must have something to do with good country cooking. This year teams from Smith Falls, Arnprior, Kingston and Ottawa will be vying for top spot. After the last shot has been fired and the scores tallied, a barbecue will be held to honor the winning team. Top shooter and most improved shooter from each team also will receive a keeper trophy. Perhaps in another 30 years some youngblood will look back with fond memories and tell his children: "I remember when the league was going into its 30-something year. Boy, were those the days." •
